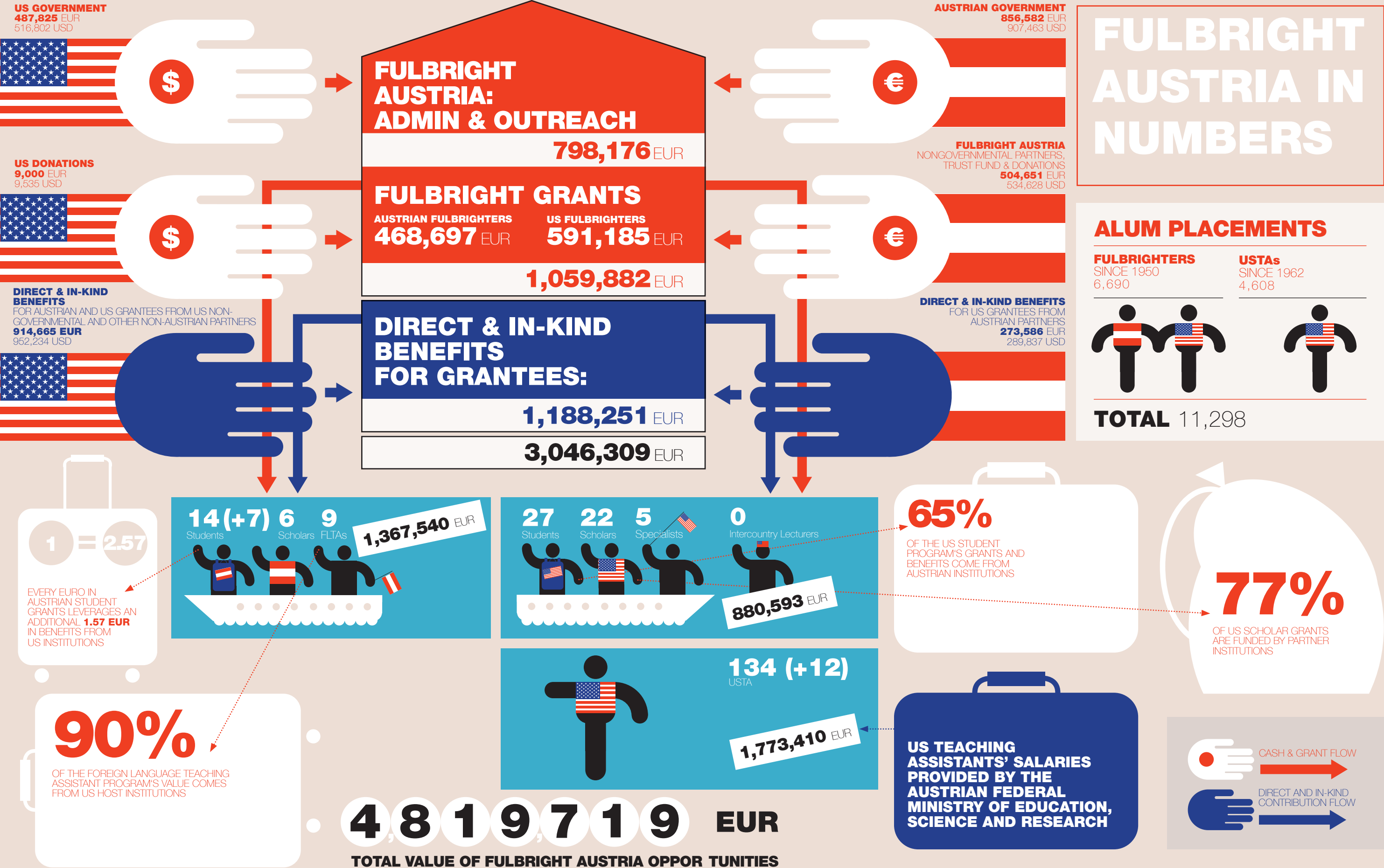
Creating opportunities and expanding horizons

This annual report is a testimony to the remarkable achievements and transformative experiences that marked our journey in the 2022–23 program year. Our shared commitment to education, cultural exchange, and global understanding has created opportunities and expanded horizons for 36 Austrians and 188 Americans, including students, scholars, artists, specialists, and teaching assistants who served as cultural ambassadors on both sides of the Atlantic. In addition to our core programs, we had the honor of hosting one US Fulbright Global Scholar in Austria. A significant stride in our commitment to student welfare was the elevation of grant levels. Responding to the Austrian government's increase of the Mach grant levels, Fulbright Austria retroactively raised the minimum grant levels for the 2022–23 cohort of US Fulbright students to €1,150 per month. This enhancement ensures that our students can fully embrace their educational journey. The trajectory of progress continues. For the 2023–24 program year, all non-degree-seeking US Fulbright students will receive an increased grant level of €1,250 per month. This advancement underscores our commitment to nurturing an environment that empowers young academics to thrive professionally and culturally. Our community's vibrancy is embodied in our events, and the 2022 Thank Fulbright – Thanksgiving and the 2023 SummerFest stand as a testament to this fact. Alums, partners, and friends came together to share their gratitude, celebrate achievements, launch new initiatives, and acknowledge the impact our programs have on individuals and communities across borders. Likewise, the winter meet & greet at Billrothhaus was a testament to the strength of our network. Participants, alums, partners, and friends mingled during the event, strengthening ties and setting the stage for future collaboration. In our pursuit of new avenues of collaboration, we are thrilled to reintroduce the Fulbright-Diplomatic Academy Student Award starting in the 2024–25 program year. This jointly sponsored grant allows US students to engage in the Diplomatic Academy's programs, enriching their perspectives and contributing to the ever-evolving field of international affairs. As we look back on the accomplishments of our program participants and forward to the future, we extend our heartfelt gratitude to our partners, donors, program participants, and all those who continue to contribute to Fulbright Austria's programs. I also want to use this opportunity to thank the Fulbright Austria board members and the entire team for their ongoing dedication to and work toward cultural exchange and mutual understanding, which are the pillars of our community. Your belief in the power of education, exchange, and collaboration drives us toward a world of shared knowledge and understanding.

As part of the global community of Fulbright programs, Fulbright Austria has promoted educational and cultural exchanges between Austria and the United States since 1950, thus making bilateral contributions to the promotion of global understanding and international cooperation. Fulbright Austria provides enterprising, creative, and diverse Austrian and US students, scholars, and teaching assistants with quality opportunities to learn, teach, and pursue research in the United States and Austria. We fulfill the Fulbright mission and mandate by managing the prestigious Fulbright scholarship program, coordinating a nationwide teaching assistantship program that places US university graduates in Austrian secondary schools, and counseling students and institutions of higher education on opportunities to study in the US as an EducationUSA advising center. Our work is sponsored by core contributions from the Austrian and US governments, with valuable additional support from other public, nongovernmental, and private partners in both countries.

The inaugural cohort of Austrian Fulbrighters, who crossed the Atlantic on the SS *Constitution* in 1951, included a substantial contingent of women. Women accounted for almost half of this group at a time when 90 percent of the students enrolled at Austrian universities were men.

Returning 2022–23 Austrian Fulbright students, scholars, and teaching assistants mingled with the 2023–24 cohort of US Fulbright program participants as well as with representatives of partner institutions, alums, and friends of Fulbright Austria on 21 September at a reception hosted at the residence of Her Excellency Victoria Reggie Kennedy, the ambassador of the US to Austria.

ARTSRAISING

In 2023, Fulbright Austria announced the new Fulbright Specialists in the Arts award, which brings US artists together with Austrian institutions for a productive grant period in Austria. As part of the associated “Artsraising” initiative, we asked our community to help us meet our annual goal of \$10,000 to support this new award.



FULBRIGHT SEMINAR IN AMERICAN STUDIES

This year, we celebrated the return of our annual in-person event at Hotel Donauschlinge from 7 to 9 May 2023. The seminar brought together over 50 current US Fulbright students and scholars and outgoing Austrian Fulbright students, scholars, and teaching assistants together for three days of community-building, networking, and cultural exchange. The seminar also featured thought-provoking presentations from three 2022–23 US Fulbright scholars.

BALLS

This year, Fulbright Austria program participants attended not one, but two Viennese balls: the TU Ball at Vienna’s regal Hofburg Palace, where attendees could practice the waltz moves they learned a week before, and the Vienna Ball of Sciences held at the Rathaus, which began with a sparkling reception for current program participants, alums, partners, and friends of Fulbright Austria.



HOMECOMING

At this year’s annual homecoming event, we celebrated the return of 28 Austrian Fulbrighters and honored over 1,000 alums from program years that ended in 1953, 1963, 1973, 1983, 1993, 2003, and 2013. Fulbright Austria presented returning program participants with certificates of completion and held a reception for alums, partners, and friends to meet the newly minted alums and celebrate their achievements together.

DIPLOMATIC ACADEMY STUDENT AWARD

In 2002, Fulbright Austria and the Diplomatic Academy (DA) agreed to co-fund a grant for a degree-seeking US Fulbright student. The award was discontinued in 2015. Eight years later, we are thrilled that Fulbright Austria and the DA will relaunch the Fulbright-Diplomatic Academy Student Award starting in the 2024–25 program year.



FUND RAISING & DEVELOP MENT

During the 2022–23 program year, Fulbright Austria successfully continued the professional outreach, fundraising, and development initiatives it launched in 2017–18. Fulbright Austria participated in the Austrian fundraising community and in Austria-wide campaigns, including “Wirtschaftthift,” “Vergiss mein nicht,” and “GivingTuesday.” Since 2017, Fulbright Austria has raised over €210,000 through Austrian donations and over €67,000 through US donations from eight decades of generous Austrian and US alums as well as bighearted friends of Fulbright Austria. Donations made in Austria to the Fulbright Austria Opportunity Fund were matched 1:1 thanks to matching funds in the amount of €150,000 made available to Fulbright Austria by the Austrian Federal Ministry of Education, Science and Research (BMBWF) in 2017 and again in 2020 to incentivize alum giving.

Additionally, during its annual SummerFest drive, Fulbright Austria launched a new “Arts-raising” initiative for a long-term restricted fund to support US citizens coming to Austria and to encourage Austrian institutions to host program participants from all fields in the arts, including fine arts, performing arts, visual arts, literary arts, and arts management. To make this co-sponsored award possible, donations raised will be used to augment the grant for a US Fulbright Specialist in the Arts and to pay for their round-trip international travel. A generous anonymous donation of \$43,000 was made available to match Austrian and US donations made to this discrete fund 1:1. More than 190 alum donors made contributions throughout the 2022–23 program year. As a result of alum donations, Fulbright Austria will be in a position to sustain the levels of support for all Austrian and US Fulbright students during the 2023–24 program year. Fulbright Austria’s annual “Thank Fulbright –

Thanksgiving” and SummerFest events were once again a success in our community, with more than 150 members of the community collectively donated over €17,000 during these annual calls for support. As part of its efforts to increase community engagement and support on both sides of the Atlantic, Fulbright Austria established the Fulbright Austria Alum Advisory Panel in 2017. Members of the panel rotate every two years and provide advice on fundraising and development initiatives. On 1 April 2023, Fulbright Austria welcomed five new panel members from Austria and the US. The 2023 panel includes one former Austrian Fulbright student, one former Austrian Fulbright scholar, one former Austrian Fulbright foreign language teaching assistant, one former US Fulbright student, two former US Fulbright scholars, one former combined grantee who remained in the USTA Program for a second year, the alumni relations manager, and the executive director.

Fulbright awards change lives and enhance careers. The Austrian Fulbright Student Program provides generous financial and administrative support to Austrian students and young professionals who have completed their first degrees and are interested in pursuing a master’s degree in the US.

Fulbright Austria works with its partners at the Institute for International Education (IIE) in New York City to provide comprehensive support to candidates that begins with coaching students on how to optimize their applications. Candidates identify programs of their choice in a wide range of disciplines, select and apply to four of the 1,600 US universities, and are often accepted to multiple institutions. Accepted candidates receive a scholarship of up to \$35,000 from Fulbright Austria subsidized entirely

by the Austrian Federal Ministry of Education, Science and Research, and the US institutions they decide to attend often provide additional financial support. In the 2022–23 program year, the total value of the additional support institutions provided was considerable, significantly reducing the personal investments made by grantees in order to finance their education and relocation to the US. Fulbright students enhance their skill sets in challenging programs of their own choice and enjoy all of the benefits of being members of an international network of Fulbrighters in the US. They enjoy the ongoing support of Fulbright Austria and IIE throughout their stay, including enrichment seminars in the US that allow them to deepen relationships not just with US citizens, but also with Fulbright students from countries around the globe.

At this critical point of inflection where technology increasingly shapes every aspect of our lives—from communication and work to accessing information and healthcare—my time as an Austrian Fulbright student at the University of Washington's Master of Human-Computer Interaction and Design (MHCI+D) program has been transformative. Through engaging with a diverse faculty, MHCI+D's focus on designing for social good and on understanding user perspectives has fundamentally changed my approach to HCI and design. My Fulbright experience has also broadened my perspective through exposure to new cultural experiences and leading experts at the intersection of design, technology, and humanity. The knowledge and experiences gained already are and will be invaluable as I strive to create technology, products, and services that are inclusive, equitable, and beneficial for all.

US FULBRIGHT STUDENT PROGRAM

The US Fulbright Student Program annually provides a diverse cohort of recent graduates and graduate students as well as PhD candidates from institutions all over the US with opportunities to study or conduct research in Austria. US Fulbright students seek affiliation with Austrian institutions that specialize in their fields of interest and come from all disciplines. More than half of the US Fulbright students also work part-time as secondary-school teaching assistants as recipients of the so-called Combined Grant and the Community-Based Combined Grant. The former pairs the teaching assignment with a research project, while the latter pairs the teaching assignment with volunteer work at a local community or cultural organization. Both of these grants are opportunities that are unique to Fulbright Austria.

Fulbright Austria receives support from generous partners who fund nearly all of the awards brokered by Fulbright Austria. In the 2022–23 program year, Fulbright Austria welcomed five US students to ten institutions of higher education across Austria. The 2022–23 cohort included five Fulbright-Austrian Marshall Plan Foundation Awards, four Fulbright-Mach Awards for doctoral candidates, one Fulbright-IFK Junior Visiting Fellow in cultural studies, seven combined grants, and three community-based combined grants. In addition to monthly maintenance awards, all grantees received a comprehensive benefits package that included tuition waivers and health coverage. During the past program year, US Fulbright students researched the therapeutic properties of psilocybin, explored the economics of musical aesthetics at the Austrian opera, and performed as a percussionist as a member of an Austrian music ensemble.

I have always been interested in studying psychedelic therapeutics ever since I got into science and learned about the past and current research into their efficacy in treating various forms of mental illness, such as PTSD, end-of-life anxiety, and treatment-resistant depression. However, due to persisting stigma and prohibitive laws around their regulation and research, I was unable to find my foot in the door as a young scientist. With the incredible help of Fulbright Austria, the Medical University of Innsbruck (host institution), and the Colorado School of Mines (home institution), my dream has become a reality: I am helping to structurally and mechanistically characterize the proteins in magic mushrooms that biosynthesize psilocybin!

The skills I have cultivated and connections I have made during my Fulbright grant are monumental steppingstones in the direction of my life's work. I am eternally grateful to Fulbright and to my home and host institutions for giving me a platform to reach my highest potential and to contribute to the research and discussion around the future of psychedelic therapeutics. Onward and upward!

AUSTRIAN FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR PROGRAM

The Austrian Fulbright Scholar Program serves up-and-coming as well as established scholars. It provides early- and mid-career professionals, academics, and researchers with opportunities to teach and pursue research at institutions in the US and simultaneously establish professional networks in a setting that stimulates bilateral collaboration and institutional linkages. In 2022–23, Fulbright Austria supported six promising Austrians in the fields of communications, law, medical sciences, political sciences, social sciences, and sociology.

The program also provides grants for established scholars designed to promote Austrian studies and comparative Austrian-American studies in the US in particular. The Dietrich W. Botstiber Foundation has funded an award for a visiting professor of Austrian-American studies since 2012, and the University of Minnesota has cosponsored an award for a visiting professor since 2001. Furthermore, Fulbright Austria annually sponsors three to four Fulbright Grants for Teaching, Research, Career Development, or Institutional Collaboration. The 2022–23 Austrian Fulbright scholars Raffael Heiss, Jürgen Pirker, Mario Rothbauer, and Lisa Schmidhuber received the Fulbright

Grant for Teaching, Research, Career Development, or Institutional Collaboration for their projects at Georgetown University (Washington, DC), University of Denver (Colorado), the HSS Research Institute (New York), and Stanford University (California). Bernhard Weidinger was awarded the Fulbright-Botstiber Visiting Professor of Austrian-American Studies in the United States grant for his project entitled "Schools of Men: Masculinity and Politics in Austrian and American Student Fraternities" at Northwestern University (Illinois), and Petra Aigner received the Fulbright Visiting Professor at the University of Minnesota (Minnesota).

I feel very fortunate to have been part of the 2022–23 cohort of Austrian Fulbright scholars. Thanks to Fulbright Austria, my hosts at Stanford University, and my home university—the Vienna University of Economics and Business—I had the opportunity to spend the fall quarter in the Bay Area. Leaving my familiar surroundings and daily routine for a few months allowed me to focus on my research projects, have inspiring conversations with my SCANCOR colleagues and numerous people I met during my stay, and get inspired by academic input and the special environment of the Stanford campus. The stay triggered new ideas and gave me a new perspective on my research. Another special aspect of my stay was getting to know the US university system and culture. For example, I had the pleasure of celebrating Halloween and Thanksgiving with my friends and host family. My Fulbright stay at Stanford was a unique experience, and I enjoyed interacting with scholars from around the world.

US FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR PROGRAM

The US Fulbright Scholar Program offers exciting opportunities for leading US academics and artists to engage with students and faculty at Fulbright Austria’s wide variety of partner institutions, which include universities, universities of applied sciences, research centers, and museums all over Austria. It annually provides up to 25 scholars, scientists, professionals, and artists with awards conceived to facilitate a flexible combination of teaching and research. A Fulbright award frequently functions as a catalyst for ongoing institutional relationships—Fulbright grantees and their Austrian hosts often embark on joint research projects, publish collaborative papers, or develop staff and student exchange programs. In 2022–23, Fulbright Austria placed grantees—whose expertise included area studies, arts, biology, business, computer science, engineering, environmental sciences, history, law, literature, political science, psychology, sociology, and travel/tourism—at institutions across Austria.

Grantees receive a maintenance stipend, a travel subsidy, and program-related health benefits as well as ongoing support from Fulbright Austria prior to and during their grant period. The fact that Austria consistently ranks among the top-ten destinations in the world for US Fulbright scholars is a testament to its partners’ commitment to international collaboration and exchange—as is the fact that they provide the lion’s share of funding for these awards.

FULBRIGHT SPECIALIST PROGRAM

The Fulbright Specialist Program allows Austrian host institutions to invite highly qualified US academics and professionals for short-term visits of two to six weeks. Program participants can apply their knowledge and expertise to a diverse array of activities, including consulting on faculty or workforce development, developing academic training curricula and materials, mentoring graduate students and junior faculty, advising research groups, and establishing new exchange programs or other forms of institutional collaboration. After a competitive screening and selection process, academics on the roster are eligible to be matched with approved projects designed by Austrian host institutions.

By implementing their designed project in collaboration with the Fulbright Specialist, host institutions gain global perspectives from experienced academics and professionals, execute projects that require a rapid response or flexible timeline through short-term exchanges, and build sustained relationships with individuals and institutions in the US. In 2022–23, Austrian institutions carried out five projects with US experts Marjorie Agosin, Edward Bergman, Corey Dolgon, Paul Edmunds, and Dena Shottenkirk under the auspices of the Fulbright Specialist Program.

Fulbright Austria provides many extraordinary possibilities to its recipients. For me, it transformed the way I think and understand the complex map of intellectual inquiry among scholars and students from diverse parts of the world. Fausto Sarmiento conducted research on human-environment interactions in the tropical mountain geographies of Austria, Japan, and Chile.



My Fulbright Global Scholar award magnified my appreciation for both the culture and nature of Austria and rendered a very stimulating mutual understanding in favor of mountain research.

Coincidentally, 2022 was declared the "International Year of Mountain Sustainable Development;" my award afforded advancing "montology" across longitude, latitude, and altitude. Participants in the Foreign Language Teaching Assistant (FLTA) program spend an academic year living, teaching, and studying on a US university campus. Each year, Fulbright Austria matches FLTAs with host institutions located from coast to coast, where they work together with experienced professors of German in both formal and informal settings. FLTAs use their skills as native speakers to enliven their classrooms and share Austrian culture with their students.

In the 2022–23 program year, Fulbright Austria placed nine FLTAs at universities and liberal arts colleges in seven states. FLTAs received a generous, customized package from their host institutions as well as a tailor-made maintenance grant from Fulbright Austria conceived to

ensure that all FLTAs receive fundamentally the same level of support. Each host institution waived tuition for two courses, which allowed FLTAs to pursue their individual academic interests on a part-time basis. They also provided FLTAs with on-campus room and board and a small stipend or a stipend large enough to cover living expenses, accommodations, and meals. Fulbright Austria also provided each FLTA with a travel grant to subsidize their flights to and from the US.

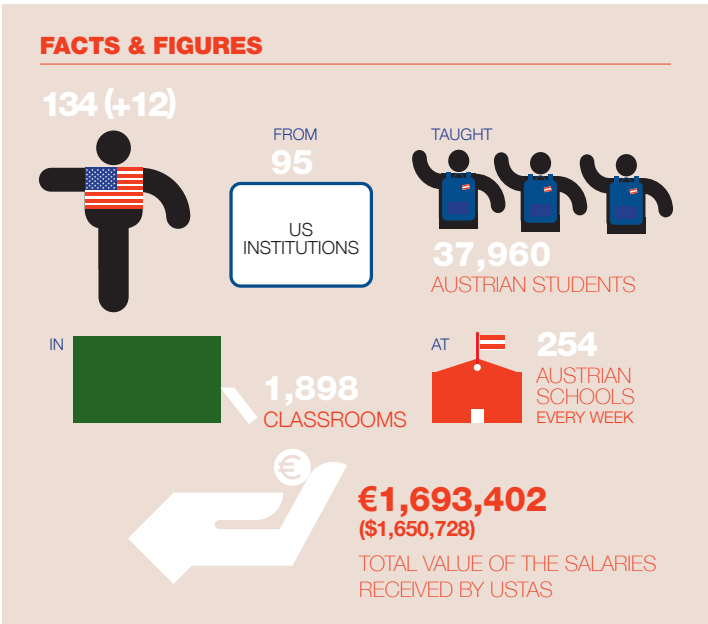
The FLTAs' year in the US provided them with valuable first-hand knowledge of the diverse fabric of life in the US. In addition to their academic responsibilities, FLTAs also immersed themselves in their local communities and forged lasting friendships with US students.

US TEACHING ASSISTANTSHIP PROGRAM



Fulbright Austria has been instrumental in administering the US Teaching Assistantship program for the Austrian Federal Ministry of Education, Science and Research (BMBWF) since the program’s inception in 1962. This program has continuously grown over the years, and Fulbright Austria is proud to include the USTA program in its portfolio of academic and cultural exchange.

In the 2022–23 program year, Fulbright Austria was instrumental in administering the placement of US citizens in secondary schools in communities large and small all over Austria in a program funded completely by the BMBWF. Each USTA received a part-time salary and was fully insured in the Austrian healthcare system as compensation for sharing their under-

standing of the US in Austrian classrooms for 13 hours per week. They animated English-language instruction and simultaneously gave Austrian students a better feeling for American culture—in all of its diversity. In light of the USTAs’ different backgrounds, the young Austrians they interacted with developed a more nuanced perspective on the United States. The USTAs also gained deep insights into Austrian culture by actively participating in their respective communities. Some enrolled at Austrian universities, and others volunteered at NGOs or joined local groups such as choirs, dance troupes, and sports clubs. All of them improved their German-language skills while living in Austria and returned to the US with a more profound understanding of the country and its people.

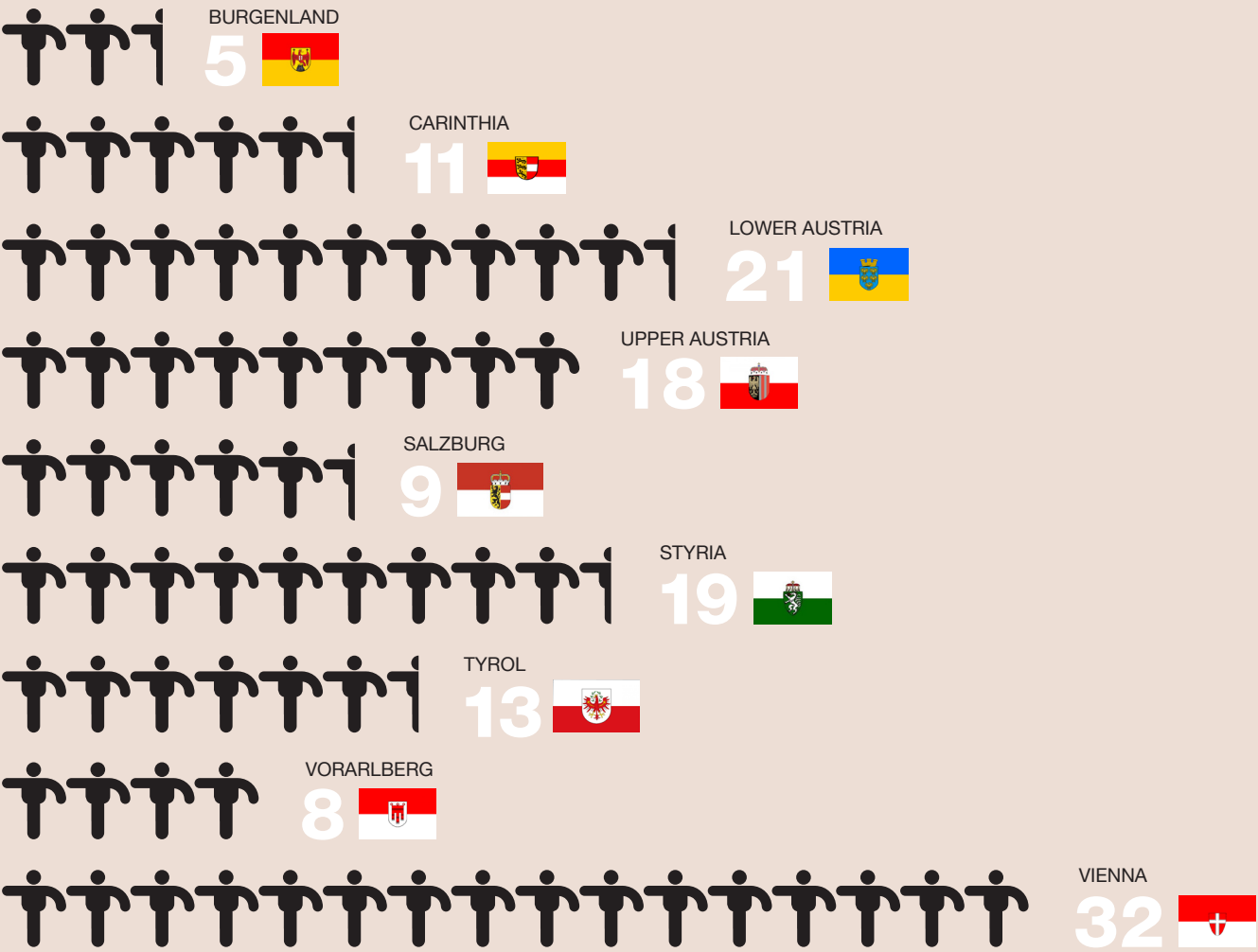

Fulbright Austria has handled advising in Austria as part of its “broad mandate” to promote mutual understanding since its inception in 1950 and serves as a clearinghouse for US queries about educational opportunities in Austria and the US. It is a part of EducationUSA, a US Department of State-supported network of hundreds of advising centers around the world devoted to providing international students with accurate, comprehensive, and current information about how to apply to US colleges and universities. Fulbright Austria’s EducationUSA advises students by phone, by email, using teleconference tools, or in person about their unique academic situations and is the contact point for US university representatives interested in learning more about higher education in Austria.

One of the ways that EducationUSA works to promote access to US higher education in Austria is by attending various educational fairs that take place in Austria throughout the year. EducationUSA has been a mainstay at the BeSt3 – the Job, Training and Education Fair in Vienna, Austria’s largest education fair, since 2015. At the BeSt3, EducationUSA advises students interested in studying in the US in one-on-one conversations and in formal presentations on diverse topics, such as scholarship opportunities, US university applications, and interviews. EducationUSA is also active on social media. In addition to supplying relevant articles and resources related to studying in the US on a weekly basis, EducationUSA offers regular webinars that cover a broad range of topics, including how to finance your education, navigating university life as an international student, and resources for students with disabilities.



HISTORY STRUCTURE AND GOVERNANCE

HISTORY AND STRUCTURE

The Fulbright Program is named after J. William Fulbright (1905–1995), the US senator from Arkansas (D - 1945–75) who conceived of and sponsored the legislation that established it in 1946. The Fulbright Act ingeniously converted the proverbial swords of war into plowshares of peace after World War II by authorizing the secretary of state to use proceeds from the sale of surplus war property overseas to finance an unprecedented number of bilateral educational exchanges of students, teachers, and scholars between the United States and other countries. It was a visionary and pioneering initiative that laid the foundations for the development of educational exchange programs and study abroad in the US as well as international educational exchange globally.

Between 1948 and 1953, a unique requirement of the Fulbright Act called for the establishment of binational commissions with binational boards in the 28 countries in Europe, Asia, and the Pacific where revenues from the sale of wartime surpluses were available. These commissions were entrusted with managing the revenues earmarked for the program and responsible for decision-making and on-site management. The US Educational Commission in Austria—popularly called the “Fulbright commission”—was established in 1950, and Fulbright Austria is proud to be among the first generation of binational Fulbright commissions that form the philosophical, historical, institutional, and financial core of the program. There are 49 binational Fulbright commissions worldwide today that account for 80 percent of the program’s 380,000 US and international alums, who annually contribute over \$100 million to the program.

After revenues from the sale of wartime surpluses were exhausted, Congress passed the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961—better known as the Fulbright-Hays Act—to broaden the scope of the Fulbright Program, give it new flexibility, and to provide an annual appropriation for its funding as a line item in the federal budget. It also gave partner governments and other public and private organizations in countries with binational commissions the all-important opportunity to contribute toward the costs of the program.

The Fulbright-Hays Act of 1961 coupled with the bilateral “Agreement between the Federal Government of Austria and the Government of the United States of America for the financing of certain educational and cultural exchange programs” of 1963 (Austrian Federal Register (Bundesgesetz-

blatt) 1963/213) form the current statutory basis of the Austrian-American program. This revised bilateral agreement reestablished, reorganized, and renamed the old US Educational Commission in Austria and reinvented it as the Austrian-American Educational Commission, a binational organization capable of receiving and disbursing funds for exchange programs from both governments, other public and private organizations, and individuals.

The importance of this new agreement was not only that it enabled the partner governments to start sharing the costs of the program, which had initially been funded exclusively with US revenues. It also provided other public and private partners in Austria and the United States with opportunities to make additional cash and in-kind contributions to the program. The Republic of Austria was among the first countries in the world to start cost-sharing in the 1960s, and it has supported the Austrian-American program vigorously ever since. Fulbright Austria’s network of institutional partners accounts for the lion’s share of the cash and in-kind support Austrian and American grantees enjoy under the auspices of the Fulbright Program today. The key to the success of Fulbright Austria has been the quality of the relationships it has cultivated with an extensive network of institutional partners on both sides of the Atlantic.

The challenges associated with international educational exchange have changed dramatically since the inception of the Fulbright Program after World War II. Fulbright Austria has confronted the dual challenges of climbing costs and increasing pressures on the discretionary funding in government budgets for education and culture with the help of an expanding network of institutional partners that augment its core revenue through their manifold cash and in-kind contributions. In 2017, the Fulbright Austria board made the strategic decision to energetically pursue fundraising and development in order to give Austrian and American alums the chance to ensure that future generations of Fulbrighters will have the same kinds of life-changing opportunities that they enjoyed in the past.

Donations to Fulbright Austria are tax deductible in Austria according to Austrian income tax law, and in the United States based on a transnational giving agreement with the New York-based Institute for International Education, a registered 501(c)(3) and nonprofit that assists in the management of the stateside agendas of the Fulbright Program.

FULBRIGHT AUSTRIA BOARD AND STAFF

The Fulbright Austria board consists of ten members: five US citizens and five Austrian citizens who are nominated by their respective governments to serve on an annual basis. The five US members, including two Foreign Service officers from the US embassy in Vienna, are nominated by the US ambassador to Austria. Two of the five Austrian members appointed by the Austrian government have traditionally been representatives of the Austrian Federal Ministry of Education, Science and Research (responsible for higher education) and the Austrian Federal Ministry for Europe, Integration and Foreign Affairs, respectively, and three have been Austrian professors. The date of the initial appointment of each member is noted in parentheses.

Fulbright Austria has been proud to call the MuseumsQuartier Wien its home since 2008 and is fortunate to be one of the institutions supported by Q21, an umbrella organization that provides workspaces for a community of some 50 cultural initiatives, organizations, agencies, and editorial offices working in the cultural sector.

Binational funding as well as joint policy and decision-making are signature attributes of Fulbright commissions. The Fulbright Austria board meets on a regular basis to discuss budgetary, policy, procedural, and program issues, and it has a number of subcommittees that meet on an ad hoc basis. The board is actively involved in the selection and nomination of all Austrian and US Fulbright candidates and solicits the support of external experts, Austrian and US Fulbright alumni, and on-site US Fulbright scholars for binational candidate review panels. The chairperson and the treasurer of the board are elected each year and rotate annually between the Austrian and US members of the board.

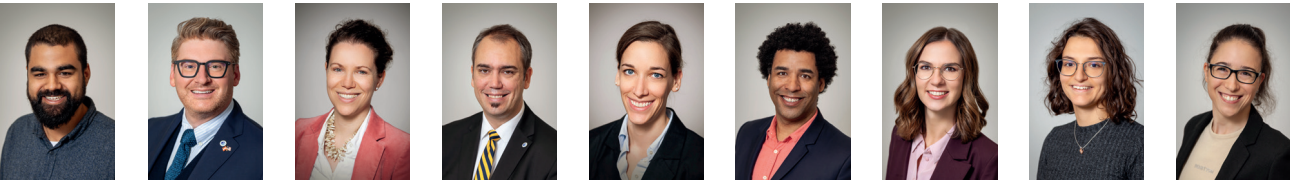

The total value of all programs and opportunities facilitated by Fulbright Austria during the 2021–22 program year was \$4,767,396 (€4,890,640) (45): \$3,116,668 (€3,197,239) for the binational Fulbright Program jointly funded by both governments with substantial contributions from partner institutions in Austria and the United States (43) and \$1,650,728 (€1,693,402) for the US Teaching Assistantship Program in Austria unilaterally funded by the Austrian Federal Ministry of Education, Science and Research (44).

Fulbright Program administration (24) and programming for the enhancement of grants, educational advising (EducationUSA), and the administration of the US Teaching Assistantship Program (25), accounted for 11.5 and 3.1 percent respectively of the total value of all programs.

The annual audit of Fulbright Austria captures all of the income received (13) and expenses incurred (28). Fulbright Austria has five different source of revenue: i) discretionary core funding from both governments; ii) dedicated funding from governments and institutional partners earmarked for specific activities or grants; iii) revenues associated with services rendered; iv) revenue from the AAEC Trust Fund; and v) donations to the Fulbright Austria Opportunity Fund.

Fulbright Austria receives annual discretionary core funding from the US Department of State’s Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (1) and the Austrian Federal Ministry of Education, Science and Research (BMBWF) (3). These core contributions are primarily used to fund the costs of administrating the Fulbright Program proper (24) and other grant-enhancing activities, educational advising, and the administration of the BMBWF’s US Teaching Assistantship Program (25). These costs are also defrayed by some additional annual US governmental sources that are earmarked for specific purposes (2) as well as support received for services rendered related to the administration of the BMBWF’s US Teaching Assistantship Program (6). Fulbright Austria drew down \$1,950 (€2,000) from donations made to Fulbright Austria Opportunity Fund for grants from Austria (8) and \$6,726 (€6,900) from donations made to Fulbright Austria Opportunity Fund for grants from the US (9) and received \$34,073 (€34,954) from partners for administrative overheads (10). This year Fulbright Austria generated \$32,104 (€32,934) from adjustments and other incomes and did not drawdown from its AAEC Trust Fund to subsidize program costs (11).

Fulbright Austria uses the discretionary core funding from both governments (1 and 3) to manage or leverage additional dedicated revenue for the program. Consequently, the lion’s share of the revenue for grants dedicated funding from Austrian public sources or derived from Fulbright Austria’s broad network of institutional partnerships. The Austrian government directly provides funding earmarked for the costs of all grants for Austrian Fulbright students enrolled in US postgraduate programs (4) as well as some awards for US research students in Austria (5). Income from institutional partners is almost exclusively used to fund grants for US scholars and a number of US students (7).

Fulbright Austria expended a total of \$1,061,069 (€1,088,499) on grants (23): \$532,906 (€546,682) for Austrian grantees (14–16, 21) and \$528,163 (€541,817) for US grantees (18–19, 22).

LEVERAGING VALUE

Fulbright Austria effectively more than doubled the impact of every dollar spent on grants (23) by leveraging another dollar of additional support for grantees (42). Austrian and US grantees receive these cash or in-kind benefits under the auspices of their awards directly on site from partner institutions in the form of salaries, additional scholarships, stipends, tuition remissions, room and board, housing, or other benefits.

The total value of the additional direct and in-kind support that Fulbright grantees received under the auspices of their Fulbright awards during the 2021–22 program year was \$1,354,909 (€1,389,935) (42): \$1,059,961 (€1,087,363) for Austrian grantees (34) and \$294,948 (€302,572) for US grantees (41).

Fulbright Austria grantees received a total of \$2,415,978 (€2,478,435 €) in support in grants and other forms of additional direct and in-kind support (23 + 42) during the 2021–22 program year.

Since 1962, Fulbright Austria has been instrumental in administering the recruitment, screening, and placement of US college and university graduates in the teaching assistantship program funded by the BMBWF outside of the Fulbright Program architecture, and the opportunities it brokered for 132 US teaching assistants and 10 US Fulbright combined grantees at Austrian secondary schools during the 2021–22 program year represented \$1,650,728 (€1,693,402) and \$125,055 (€128,288) in value (44, 40), respectively. US teaching assistants do not apply for Fulbright awards in the US, nor do they receive Fulbright grants in Vienna. Fulbright Austria directly handles applications for this BMBWF-funded program and collaborates with the Austrian authorities to select and place finalists as salaried, part-time teachers, who also receive comprehensive medical insurance coverage at Austrian secondary schools.

THE FULBRIGHT AUSTRIA OPPORTUNITY FUND

In the course of its strategic planning exercise “Fulbright in the 21st Century” in 2016, the Fulbright Austria board decided to develop its fundraising and development capacities in order to respond to a number of structural challenges associated with ongoing tight public spending for education and culture, inflationary pressures, and increasing costs. Vice Chanellor Reinhold Mitterlehner, who was the minister for science, research and economy at the time, enthusiastically greeted this initiative by providing Fulbright Austria with a grant of €150,000 to incentivize giving by matching donations made in Austria 1:1, and Fulbright Austria actively started soliciting donations in the 2017–18 program year. In 2020 Federal Minister Heinz Faßmann renewed this initiative with an additional grant of €150,000 to continue matching donations made in Austria.

All donations made to Fulbright Austria directly or to the Institute of International Education in New York City for Fulbright Austria under the auspices of a transnational giving agreement are tax deductible in Austria and the US, respectively. The Fulbright Austria Opportunity Fund holds all monies donated as deferred income to cover grant related expenses in the current and future program years. It had a balance of €320,828 on 30 September 2022.

Support from the friends, associates, and alums of Fulbright Austria programs plays a critical role in Fulbright Austria’s ability to ensure that the opportunities it has created and facilitated for so many grantees in the past will be available and accessible to a new generation of Fulbrighters in the future.

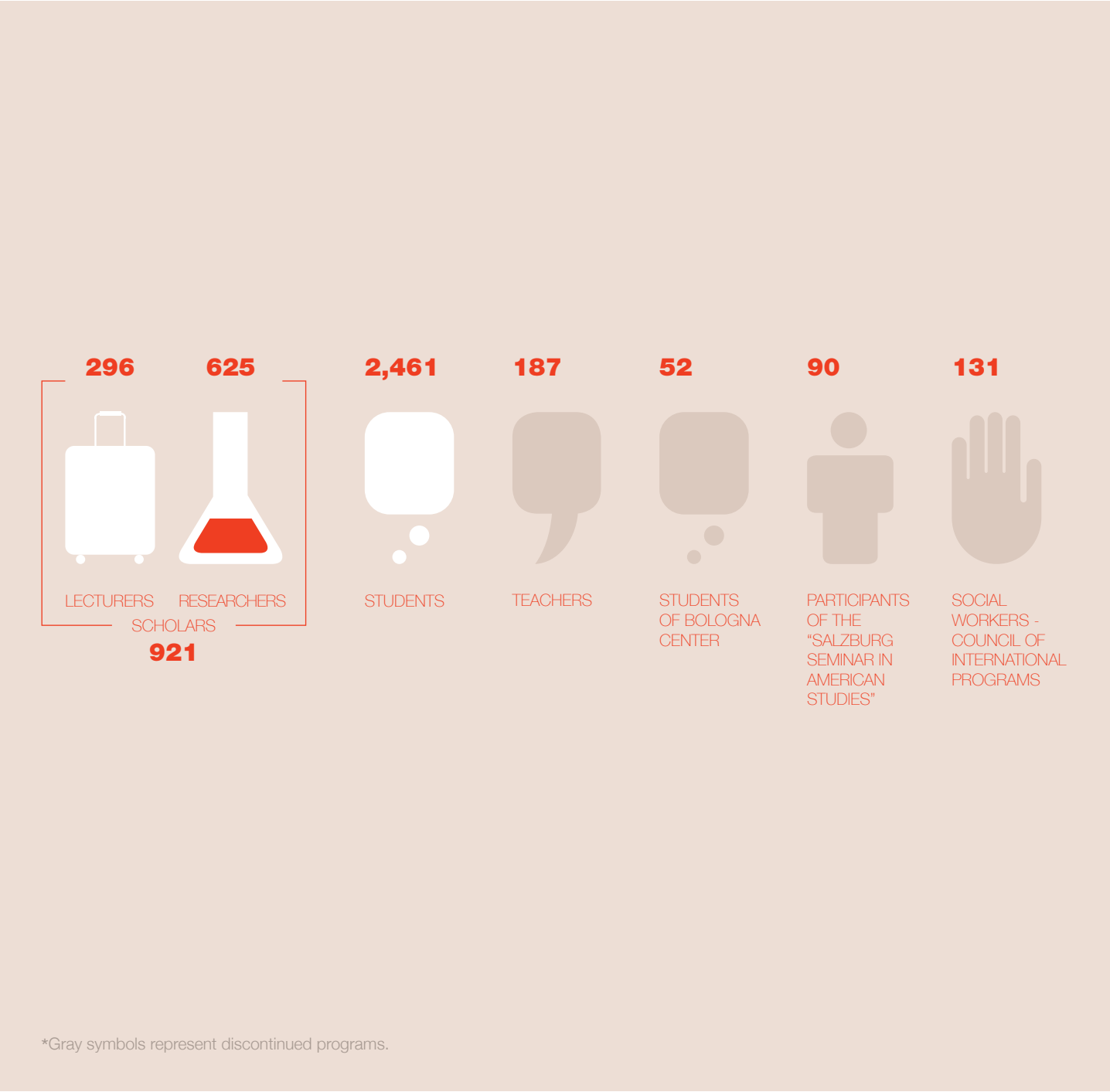

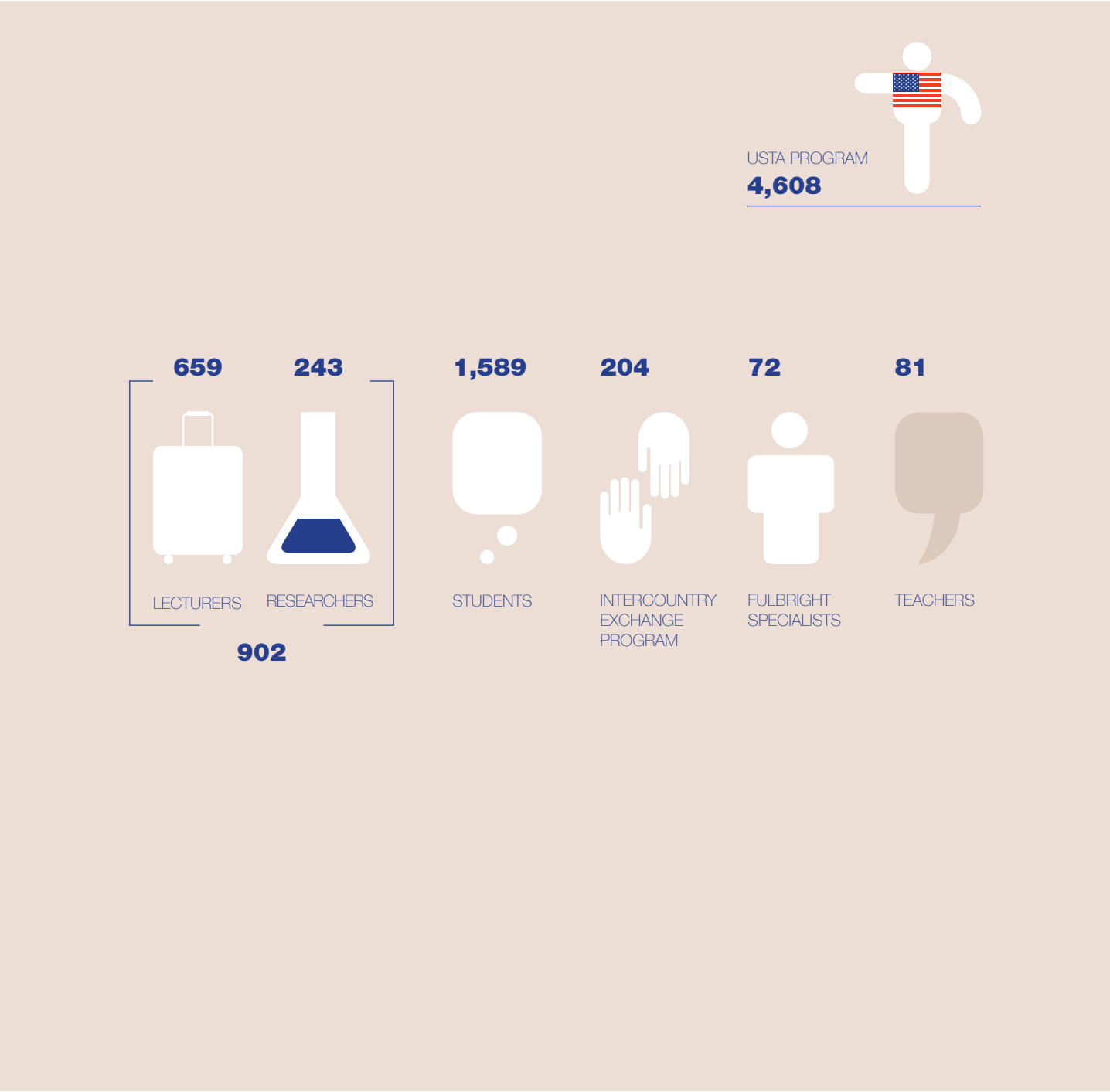

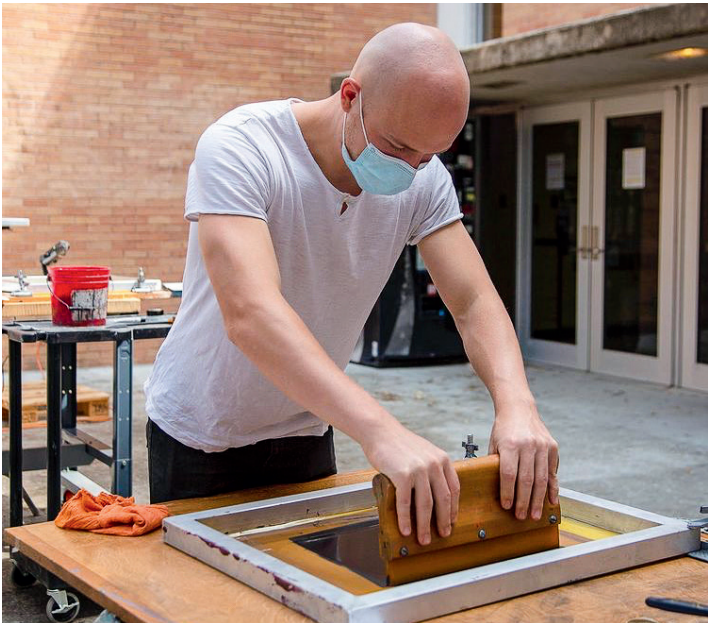
